I just saw Honeyboy within the last year myself and he was wearing the same clothes he had on for your performance. This intrigued me to ask you if I can use a few various shots from your portfolio combined with shots I have taken to create his portrait. I have looked for the right facial expression and pose on Honeyboy for quite some time now, this is the only way to translate the style & sound of his music through portraiture. As he always sits exactly the same way most of the time this is not as crucial as his facial expression. I have noticed you have captured in one of your photo's a close enough expression on him that I can work with. I also like the baseball cap he was wearing at your performance better too. I plan to do a montage background in faint washes that speaks of his life style over the years. It will somewhat resemble my Robert Johnson portrait (Me & The Devil Blues) Please let me know if using your photo is ok with you, and I can finally add HoneyBoy's legacy to my own portfolio.

BLOG Post:

Back in September, I wrote about an artist named Earl Klatzel. Some of you went to visit his site and immediately discovered a real treasure. Well, because you went to explore, Earl came over this way to see what was going on. He then emailed me. And since then, we've exchanged numerous emails. In one of the emails, he asked if he could use some photos to help him build a portrait of Honeyboy Edwards. I said yes without hesitation (really, I'm that easy when it comes to art, it seems). A couple weeks ago, he emailed me to let me know the painting was finished and gave me permission to share it.

Honeyboy Edwards by Earl Klatzel

About the only way to do this painting justice is to quote an early email between Earl and I because what I said about his other paintings is exactly what I would say about this one.

...the right facial expression and pose as a means of communicating the style and sound of his music [regarding Honeyboy Edwards]. You do that so brilliantly in your work already. I don't know if it's the colors you use or the obvious love you have for your subject, but you capture more than mere ambience. I've spent hours getting lost in your images. Each tells a story in a way that I can't describe. There's warmth, sorrow, joy, and even music ringing forth from your paintings that many others lack. Believe me, I've poured through thousands of photos of paintings, drawings, and photographs, and the majority are "nice" but fail to move me the way your work does. And that's why I come back to it time and time again.

Like most Klatzel portraits, Honeyboy is not only shown in the foreground as we know him, but the background tells the story of how he lived as a younger man — the life that shaped him and led him to where he is now. Amazingly, Earl captures the essence of his subjects with such clarity that I can hear the music and feel the wooshing of air as Honeyboy plays his guitar.

My imagination is good, but not that good. Only art brings that out. And I am grateful and honored to have been a tiny part of the process. Thank you, Earl!

Can you imagine a world without art or music? I can't. It'd be like a world without books, without the laughter of children, without birds singing, and dare I get so touchy-feely and say like a life without a single embrace. To me, that's not living. That's exsisting. And that is simply unacceptable to me.

So go on, go soak up some beauty. Feel the sun warm you, smell the richness of the soil, feel the dust on your skin, and hear the music in Earl's work. Tell him I said hello! ...Joanie

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Thanks for the reply Earl. I will talk with Honeyboy in the next few days and if he says to go ahead with a t-shirt we may do so soon. One question I have is - have you clarified what the rights are of the original photographer or holder of the photo copyright when you paint an image of the photo or incorporate an image of the photo into a painting? Who took the photo of Honeyboy for example?

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Yes, I have always honored the copyrights of any photographs I use, this is an absolute necessity in my line of work. With Honeyboy's painting I used a combination of my photographs and a photo from a photographer by the name of Joan Hunt. I have been chatting with her just the past few days, she has been patiently waiting to see the painting for a while now. I had asked her before I even started the painting if I could use her image for the pose and the certain facial expression that I was looking for. She new about my work and was an avid fan of my paintings, and offered me any of her hi-res photos to use free of copyright. She's just thrilled about the painting and asked me today if she can post it on her website.

I have been very fortunate with a lot of professional photographers that love my work. Big names like Henry Benson, Kurt Swan, Will Wallace, Joerg Leukel, Arnie Goodman have all offered me photos I may need from their portfolios, free to use. Others I have paid out for the copyrights like Ernest C Withers, David Garr, Delta Haze Corp, etc. In Honeyboys painting, I created the honey colored vest and the gold pin striped shirt for the right feeling I needed, and added the acoustic guitar. In Joan Hunts photograph, he wears a patterned vest and has an electric guitar. She knew I only needed the pose and his facial expression. My painting image will not match any photograph out there. With Rock & Roll being the music of choice through my younger years, it always contained a certain essence from where it had derived. It didn't take long to learn that Rock & Roll was created from the Blues. As I matured over the years so did my taste in music, learning more and more about the roots of my favorite music and the influences of my favorite bands. It all just kept coming back to the early Delta Blues musicians. I soon began to listen to Delta Blues and knew I was hooked. The music was created not for entertainment or profit, but to release the feelings of a time in history. Blues music came from the heart, it revealed the souls of a people that needed to speak out but were held to the silence of the times.

Listening to Blues since an early age simply all added up over the years. I had absorbed all the feelings & moods from the music and was able to reflect it in my paintings. My biggest inspiration is the passion I

have for the music itself. Delta Blues influenced me so deeply that I wanted to visually document this treasure we hear, and to accurately portray its history using the real people, places and architecture of the times. My compositions & scenes are derived by using multiple photographs from the Library Of Congress, combined with extensive internet research for accuracy in styles, colors & signage.

I hope this letter answers your request for my means & passion for painting Blues Music. Thank you kindly. I'm glad you enjoyed my work. Sincerely, Earl Klatzel

- 1. How long does it take to make a painting?
- 2. How did you learn to draw and paint so well?
- 3. Who are some of your favorite artists?
- 4. What is your favorite painting or piece or artwork?

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Hi Dan, It is nice to know that your students have shown such a kind interest in the music and painting that I have felt so passionate about myself. I hope my answers will be something they can apply to their own passions that will also help advance them in their own futures.

- 1) My paintings have varied from 3 days up to 3 months from start to finish. When starting a new painting I rarely take a day off until it is completed, averaging 8 hours daily. I only work on one painting at a time so I can give it my full attention and focus. It takes 3 5 days for the small impressionistic style paintings on masonite. My canvas portraits usually take 3 4 weeks & the large canvas history paintings can take from 2 to 3 months depending on their size and how much research needed within them. My process and application of paint is quite different on canvas over masonite which requires much more time. My unique under painting process along with a high detail drawing on my canvases gives me greater dimension and realistic results that most people have noticed when viewing my originals.
- 2) I think it is the passion I have within me to create a drawing or painting the best I can. With every new painting I attempt, I've always tried to exceed the one before it. Ones self esteem and goals will have a lot to do with how far you push your artwork, and it subconsciously will reveal the artists character, feelings and soul to the viewers. Even with everything I have learned about perspective, composition and color, I am still looking for new approaches that will give my work more dimension and reality about the past.

- 3) One of my biggest inspirations is Leonardo DaVinci. I have great admiration for many of the artists in the High Renaissance period. Others include Michelangelo, Raphael and Titian. It was a period when artwork showed no limits in the realism, meanings and quality to their amazing achievements that still cannot be equaled today.
- 4) This is the hardest question of all. There is so many paintings that fall into this category it would be impossible to answer. When one truly loves art they are effected by many on an equal basis. In my own portfolio, this is still the case. I am usually effected by an image or idea that somehow sparks within to want to create a painting or drawing. Each piece of work had a reason to be created....

I have attached a few of my "classical masters" paintings here that few have seen so you can see the diversity an artist can have. It is just one more side to my many different influences. I have also painted surrealism fantasy, landscapes, nude figure and abstracts. As a whole, I know my body of work tells a story of who I am, what I feel, and my influences in life. Thank you again, I appreciate your interest and dearly loved the fond experience I have received from you all. Sincerely, Earl Klatzel

We painted over the course of a few hours, and it was fun for my students to see that you create a painting over the course of several 8 hour days or months! Thanks for the communication. 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Hi Dan, Thank you for the review of your students paintings, they all show the early stages of creativity from which we all start as artists. Taking an idea or thought and transforming it into an understood image can be a very difficult task as we use a separate part of our brain to do this. The more we exercise this task the better we become as artists. Ones passion to create art will be the defining level one will achieve in making art, it all comes from your heart.

There was an interesting project that was given to us in the art college back in 1994. It consisted of picking any "masterpiece" from one of the great masters and recreate it as close as possible, but the catch was that we had to put some change into it that somehow would bring it to date. Of course I went with Leonardo DaVinci's only known self portrait, and the element I added to bring it to date was adding a pierced eyebrow with a beaded earring. My re-creation of Leonardo's self portrait reflected his eccentrics and character in our current day norms.

Adam Gussow wrote: University of Mississippi professor wants to interview you 2014

Dear Earl Klatzel: I'm a professor here at the University of Mississippi, teaching courses in American literature and blues culture. My current project is a book on the devil and the blues tradition. It's 4/5ths completed. The chapter I'm working on right now concerns "the crossroads" in Clarksdale--specifically, the way in which the city of Clarksdale, with the considerable help of Vic Barbieri's three-guitar sculpture, has managed to brand itself in the public mind as the home of "the" crossroads.

In the course of my research, I came across Les Barber's plan in 2008-2009 to create an impressive complex at the crossroads site. You seem to have been a key player in the whole episode. I gather that something went wrong at some point and the plan fell through. Although the main focus of my chapter is Vic's monument (i.e., the 1998-1999 period of time), I'm extremely interested in speaking with you about Les's plan. I just discovered the Robert Johnson park in Hazelhurst. I had no idea such a park was in the planning! Now I would urgently like to interview both you and Les Barber about your plans--which certainly merit a place in my book. many thanks in advance, Adam Gussow

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Hi Adam, thank you for calling, it was very interesting talking with you today, I quite enjoyed discussing this topic with someone that has followed the blues so closely. I look forward to your book! Here is the summary for the two park projects:

The Robert Johnson Crossroads & Blues Legends Park, Clarksdale, MS

I was contacted by Les Barber CEO of the Crossroads Group LLC early 2008 about his idea of "The Robert Johnson Crossroads Park" at the old Hwy 61 & 49 intersection in Clarksdale. Saying he contacted me because he loved the way I can capture the true essence of those early times in all my paintings, and was hoping that I could translate that same feeling into a design for The RJ Crossroads & Blues Legends Park. My knowledge of blues music history and my artistic capability gave him the entire package he was looking for.

We were also welcomed by The Robert Johnson Blues Foundation (Steven Johnson) after I had contacted him in regards to donating a canvas print of my work to their museum. With that being accomplished, they learned of the RJ Park I was working on for Clarksdale, and showed great appreciation towards the project for keeping their grandfather's legacy alive. I must acknowledge that the Johnson family did state to me they do not believe any of the myths that surround his life, but understanding the circumstances gave their time & support with its promotion.

Les also planned on having a multi level Crossroads Hotel & Entertainment Complex situated beside the park that governed the entire block. I still have some of the press releases on the hotel complex, and all of my RJ Crossroads Park design is saved for reference.

The park construction was just about to break ground when the Financial Crisis struck and the Crossroads Group LLC began losing investors to the point of finally folding. Over the years Les and I have since promoted this crossroads park idea in hopes of new investors that also see the great importance of the RJ Park at the crossroads.

The Robert Johnson Blues Park, Hazlehurst, MS

Finally in 2013, Les Barber was contacted by Steven Johnson in regards to having the park built by the RJBF through public contribution & funding. The conditions were that they wanted to build it in Chrystal Springs as the Robert Johnson Blues Park, right along side the RJBF building. Les again contacted me for re-designing the park to fit into the new proposed property. The Crystal Springs property dimensions were way to small, very limited and unsuitable to fit a functioning park design, and would need to be relocating to a larger size property to be even possible.

I proposed a new idea to Les & Steven about building the park in Hazlehurst, being RJ's birth town only 8 miles away and much more significant to the cause. Thrilled with my idea, Steven Johnson approached the Mayor of Hazlehurst (Henry Banks) with the park idea, and to our surprise was greatly welcomed. After about a month, I was given three properties to choose from in Hazlehurst for picking the best suited property for the park. The old schoolyard lot (200' x 250') that sat completely empty was the ideal location & size for the new park design.

So starting from scratch, I incorporated everything I had learned from the first park design, and then spent 3 months on a new more precise RJ Park design that told the full story to his music. It reflects the 1930's era, the lifestyle of RJ, each song he created along the blues hwy, and the folklore that surrounded his short life. The overall curb appeal of the park reflects the style & grace of the bluesman, while a strong and masculine perimeter & grand entrance reflected its musical importance. The new park design was a complete success and gratefully accepted by Les and Steven as more then they ever imagined it could be. They felt it could easily stand as an international destination for blues fans around the world.

The planning of the International fundraising campaign was the main concern now, and after 3 months preparation it was getting very near to be announced on the Indiegogo website. I really don't know the specifics of what recently happened, but all I heard was the proposed park property was suddenly retracted by the schoolboard. So all has become quiet once again. That's the history of both park projects to date.

Can you explain the "painting reproduction rights granted by photographer"? Hudson Payer

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Hi Hudson, On certain portrait paintings I have contacted the photographers and have been granted the right to show and make reproduction prints copyright free and with no fees. Only 2 portrait paintings I've done have a preset fee payable on every print I sell.

Unless it's a rare photograph like Robert Johnson or Charley Patton, any golden oldie, my paintings become quite generic. I use multiple photo's in some portraits in order to reflect the musicians character & music sound, as you can see with the BB King photo reference I just sent you. I have never projected any photo image onto a canvas, so no painting of mine will ever align to its photograph. My paintings are all drawn & painted through hand eye coordination, which gives them natural movement and life within my mark making. Painting famous people from photo's is really foggy about copyrights. It all comes down to doing the right thing and giving credit where it's due, which I do in every possible case... Thanks, Earl

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Hi Earl, The cut is still long, but we are getting close to having a sense of the specific paintings of yours we'd like to feature. 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Earl Klatzel wrote: in regards to Shemekia Copeland 2022

Hi Beverly! How nice that our paths cross again! I was so glad to see your name attached to Shemekia's website, and remembered how nice it was to talk with you. If you don't quite remember me, which I think you do still being on my mailing list. You relayed Tommy Shannon & Chris Layton T-shirts with the painting I did of Stevie Ray Vaughan printed on them. I think that was in 2006. Which then lead to Chris Layton to phone me at home from Austin, Texas about ordering 20 cloth prints. Chris's wife Betty was creating designer pillows for the Vaughan family and all of the SRV band members, and they wanting my Stevie image as the centerpiece of the pillows. Anyway, that honor was a special highlight in my career.

But my reason for contacting you this time, is to find a way I can send Shemekia a gracious thank you note for the personal favor she did for me at the 2006 Buddy Guy / Shemekia Copeland concert in Calgary. If it wasn't for Shemekia's friendly personality and good will, my paintings would have never aided Buddy Guy in telling his life story in the 2021 documentary: "The Blues Chase The Blues Away". It's really quite fascinating how Shemekia's generous favor set a path for this opportunity of a lifetime, 14 years later. My question to you is.... would it be possible for you to forward a thank you note to Shemekia from me? If so, I will write one and send it to you.

But I'd still like to tell you the sequence of events that lead to my blues paintings being picked for the movie. Below...

In 2006 the Calgary Convention Center billed Buddy Guy with Shemekia Copeland as the opener. My wife Tammy & I knew of Shemekia Copeland's music since the 90's, and well aware of her dad Johnny. The Convention Center arranged the concert hall with a cash bar, and many large round tables that sat at least 12 people at each. Being our 2nd time to a Buddy Guy concert, Tammy & I decided to sit at the back of the hall and enjoy the music from afar. Our back table stayed nearly empty which gave us plenty of room. I had brought along a set of my Bluesworks promo posters in case there was a chance of giving them to Buddy. They promote my Blues Personalities series, and my Blues History series.

So before the concert started, I approached a tall security person beside the stage guarding the backstage access. I asked him if there was anyway I could give the posters to Buddy Guy, in which he replied no. I then asked him if he would give them to Buddy Guy for me, in which he again replied no. So returning to the table disappointed, I tossed them onto the table right where we sat.

Shemekia and her band came out and played a one hour set, and they totally blew us away. Her entire performance was nothing like her albums sounded, but more like a 60's psychedelic concert where all the songs merged together like one long tune. It was truly amazing to hear. Well after her set was done, Shemekia came to the back of the hall to autograph CD's for the public. We were so inspired to meet her after hearing the amazing psychedelic trip she had just taken us on, and lucky we were the first fans to walk up and meet her. (pic attached) As we picked out a CD for her to sign for us, we chatted with her for a few minutes before realizing that nobody was lining up to meet her. Whether it was because nobody noticed she was there, or that she was not as well known at that time, we were not quite sure. But we took the great opportunity to continue our conversation with her a while longer. Well after 5 minutes or so, a couple of girls walked up to also meet Shemekia, so we thanked her dearly for the conversation. Shemekia quickly asked us where we were sitting and I pointed to the

big empty table right beside the sales booth. She asked if she could join us to watch the Buddy Guy performance, to which we were more than delighted.

Within five minutes Shemekia joined us while they set-up the stage for Buddy's band. I had totally forgotten about my promo posters on the table sitting in front of us until they caught Shemekia's eye. She leaned forward with great interest and asked what they were, to which I replied that they were my promo posters that I hoped in giving to Buddy Guy. I explained to her that I was an artist who painted blues personalities & blues history. And then mentioned that I had no luck with getting them past the security guard at the stage. Shemekia quickly responded by saying, "I'll do it for you, I'll hand them to Buddy myself ", and off she went backstage.

Shemekia soon returned to the table after a few minutes and said she gave them directly to Buddy. We then proceeded to enjoy the entire Buddy Guy concert in her company. It was such an honor.

After the concert I never thought about the promo posters again, I knew that Shemekia had given them to Buddy, but I really didn't know if he kept them or left them behind. It was just something I'd never know.

So now jumping ahead 14 years to 2020, I get a call from Scheme Engine productions out of NY & LA, by an associate producer Hudson Payer. He asked about the use of my paintings in a PBS documentary about Buddy Guy's life story. I was absolutely overwhelmed by the opportunity and agreed to their amazing offer. I asked how they had found out about my work, in which Hudson said that it was at the film director's request, Devin Chanda. He added that Devin had seen my work while filming Buddy at his cabin for the documentary. So putting two and two together, I then realized that the promo posters that Shemekia had relayed to him for me in 2006, Buddy had kept them all those years. It was a very proud moment for me, and another pinnacle in my career as an blues history artist. And since covid had stopped Scheme Engine from filming in many places they had planned, they found that my paintings were the prefect way to tell his story by mirroring his life with my blues history paintings.

I got nothing but the highest admiration for my work by all the Scheme Engine team, and felt truly honored during the entire 6 months I had worked with them. So now I've finally had the time to try and reach out to Shemekia to thank her for her wonderful support. But as you know with trying to contact our precious musicians, easier said than done.

So glad to hear Tommy and you are still close as ever, and it sounds like you're enjoying your work too. I admire you for the amazing personalities you've surrounded yourself with, it's truly wonderful. Helping me get a thank you letter to Shemekia really means a lot to me Beverly. I really didn't think there was a way to get it to her, so I thank you so much. I have it written and I'll send it to you next. Thank you again dear, I appreciate you so much. Sincerely, Earl

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Hi Earl, I've forwarded your letter to Shemekia and the next time we speak on the phone I'll doublecheck to make sure she received it.

Outside of Shemekia and Tommy, I've pretty much retired --and resigned from my other clients. 35 years of working with the best Bluesmen and Blueswomen has been a blessing beyond words. When I think back to having the honor of working with Luther Allison, Jonny Lang, Koko Taylor, Eddy Clearwater, Clifford Antone, Ronnie Brooks and others I feel like I have to pinch myself to make sure it wasn't a dream! I know you've been doing your thing for a long time as well – glad we travelled down the blues highway together.

Just a quick PS... I know Shemekia has received your note. I added a short comment about something unrelated above it, and she replied to me.

Bev.

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Thanks Bev! That is an amazing line-up of clients. Your achievements are so impressive. I know exactly what you mean by having to pinch oneself after being blessed with a career that is somewhat unreal. Some of the special highlights of my career after the Tommy & Chris communication was meeting with Honey Boy Edwards and sitting down talking with him for half an hour, he was so candid with me. We really hit it off.

Or sitting at the head table with the late Sam Lay at the Calgary Blues Society Banquet was an honor. They commissioned me to do his portrait at the last minute for his 80th birthday that evening. I was sorry that It had to be a graphite portrait having only 2 days. My oil portraits usually take 2-3 weeks.

But getting a call from Steven Johnson in 2011 to design "The Robert Johnson Blues Park" in Mississippi for the family was one of those projects that I had to pinch myself. The honor to do such a prestige landmark was phenomenal, and I've been working with the Johnsons since 2011.

The design was loved and approved by the Johnsons & the Hazlehurst town council. But many complications arose because we were missing the right people at the top to get it off the ground. But just recently I found a new project manager here in Calgary that seems to be the right person for the job. So I have my fingers crossed. Painting blues history has been an amazing journey.
